CEO REPORT annual report 2018

This year has been an exciting though challenging year for TADQ on many counts.

We have seen growth in the types of work that we undertake, an increase in the volunteer support received from non- traditional sources and a developing public awareness of TADQ particularly through social media.

All of this is being achieved in a very uncertain environment where both the organisation and our clients are having to navigate a new way of accessing support through My Aged Care and NDIS.

We are excited to have received philanthropic support for two years to further develop controlAble program that enables young people who wish to participate in gaming to have the modified controllers that suit their needs. Without the support received from the Viertel Foundation, we would not have been able to bring this to the level it is so far, or prepare the project for further venture funding into the future.

We have also been very grateful to receive a grant from the Gambling Community Benefit Fund which enabled us to purchase a 3D Printer. This was originally intended to be used in the controlAble program however since having this equipment in house, many more custom solutions projects have benefitted by the design diversity that this brings to our products.

TADQ as all other state and territory organisations

are members of an umbrella organisation TAD Australia which received an Information Linkages & Capacity Building National Readiness Grant to be implemented over the 2018-2019 period.

The focus of this Project is the development of a national, multi-regional approach to specialist and expert delivery of advice and information regarding assistive technology and has four key deliverables:

- Development of consistent national bestpractice procedures and protocols.
- Involvement of people living with disability throughout the process to ensure information is relevant and accessible.
- Development of national website /database that delivers relevant, accurate and consistent information.
- Development of state-based information delivery channels that deliver information consistent with the national website / database.

TADQ is delighted to be specifically contributing to two key projects within the first deliverable. These are the Assistive Technology (AT) and Freedom Wheels.

These projects underpin a key commitment by all members to develop a consistent transparent service that builds on the strengths of sharing resources and enhances capacity to maintain best

practice models of delivery for all TAD services.

In 2018, TADQ continued undertaking minor home modifications in the Gold Coast and Logan region. We are continuously improving ways to provide a service offering skilled, professional, quality and client focused outcomes.

During the year we have been supported by several students from local Universities to assist in the development of a number of projects. One of these is a range of products that will be readily available to our clients. As many of these items are not complex, the inclusion of an item such as a one-handed walker is an example of the sophisticated level of design capability within TADQ enabling such an inclusion in an easy to order range.

Having the support of these students provides TADQ with opportunities to enhance our service provision in ways that our existing financial resources don't allow.

2018 has been a year of consolidation and growth. We have focused on team culture and communication at all levels whilst improving the diversity and skills of our team. Recent staff participation in our Strategic Planning process demonstrated a real commitment by all staff to the process and identification of a model of service that continues to provide the best possible outcomes for our clients.

There will be changes to the way we work over the next few years and of course, they bring many challenges. As government drives streamlined single entry point services that are promoted as providing an efficient holistic approach tailored to client's needs both clients and service providers are finding new ways to adroitly adapt to new ways of working.

I would like to thank the staff who are such a committed and dedicated group of people who individually demonstrate that they are here because of a genuine desire to make a difference to the lives of others. Thank you to Opal Halliday who has embraced the role of Operations Manager and is adept at streamlining our processes in keeping with the ever-changing environment.

This organisation has always been centered on the contribution of volunteer time by skilled professional and trade qualified individuals who give their time and skill to improve the lives of others. While sourcing those people is increasingly harder for a whole range of social and demographic reasons, we continue to be in awe of our volunteers and I genuinely say to you, Thank you.

Finally, this year I have continued to appreciate the contribution of the Board of Management who provide a diversified range of skills and expertise but also support and encourage me constantly. Thank you for your guidance and insight.

To our clients, referrers and the wider TADQ community, my sincere thanks and best wishes for 2019 as we continue to do our best to serve you.

Back in 1981 Ron Carr worked as a telephone technician for Telecom Australia in Brisbane. One day while at work, they had a visit from a gentleman called George Winston. George had recently formed a charity called TAD in New South Wales and was looking for members to join a team in Queensland. With Ron's skills in metal and wood work and some spare time outside his children and netball coaching, he thought he could help. Ron's first project was for a little 7 year old boy called Mark whose family loved camping and bush walking. Due to his condition, Spina Bifida, young Mark found walking long distances a challenge and so often his parents would carry him on family trips. However as Mark got older and heavier, this became a challenge so the family reached out to the now newly formed TADQ. Ron and another volunteer sprung into action and designed and created the perfect

rickshaw wheelchair so the family could pull him along with ease.

Ron continued to volunteer at TADQ within only one small break over the next 37 years. At the age of 78 and living with his wife Faye in Caloundra, they both recall seeing many happy smiles and feeling so many special hugs from the families they have supported. Ron has made the tough decision to retire from TADQ but will always remain a life member and a loyal friend. When asking Ron why did he stay for so long his reply was "I got out of it, as much as I put in".

We would like to take this opportunity to say the warmest thanks Ron on behalf of all the staff and volunteers at TADQ for his support and ingenious ideas and of course, for all the families that he has helped over the last 37 years.

CUSTOMISED ASSISTIVE TECHNOLOGY for children

Raising or working with children is all about giving them every opportunity to thrive, understanding their unique personalities, needs and passions and providing the right tools to support them to be the best person they can possibly be.

Having great assistive technology solutions can support your goal in raising an awesome child. Equipment around the home and out and about brings independence, joy and confidence to both caregiver and child.

MAYA'S STORY

Maya is an adorable 13 year who loves every type of craft you can think of from origami, playdough, colouring and writing and who most of all loves playing with her cousins. Maya has severe medical conditions and that means she needs to spend a lot of time resting in her bed.

When resting, she was unable to continue doing the things she loved. Mum had looked in stores and online for a table to fit over Maya's hospital bed that would allow her to continue her crafts and homework, but nothing was quite right, so she came to us to see if we could help.

Mum and Maya knew exactly what they wanted, it had to be a certain height to give her enough

room to wiggle her knees, could be moved easily when not required and to have an edge all the way round to stop any pens or craft items from falling off.

Our staff and volunteer designed and built a table that captured all the important elements requested, even attaching lockable wheels for ease of movement.

Maya will now be able to engage in educational and recreational activities from the comfort of her bed. We hope this will make those long days of being too unwell to get out of bed, just a little bit better!

CUSTOM SOLUTIONS for adults

Assistive technology is technology used by people to help them to perform functions that might otherwise be difficult or near impossible but essentially exists to enhance people's lives and to create opportunities that might not otherwise be realised. Perhaps you are a wheelchair user hooked on travelling, a new parent trying to find easy and safer ways to care for your new bundle of joy, a retiree wanting to start that new craft or hobby that you have promised yourself for years or simply someone wanting to stay independent and safe around your home.

We are here to listen and help!

MARLENA'S STORY

Twenty-seven year old Marlena was super keen to get out and about on her new recumbent bike and cruise the foreshore of her hometown, the Gold Coast. However, due to Marlena's cerebral palsy she experiences fluctuating muscle tone which meant the bike she purchased does not offer a backrest and seat that offers the safety and support she requires.

When searching for the right bike, Marlena tried many but found they were just too heavy or too high for transfer. The recumbent bike mostly suited her needs, but still was not quite right.

Loaded up with a performance car seat, she

arrived at our offices to see how we could help. The old seat was removed and the new seat added and angled at 90 degrees with some improvements to the base to assist comfort. The pedal options were shortened to allow more efficiency and the steering disconnected and handlebars locked.

With a change of backrest and some modified foot cups, this recumbent bike now offers improved postural support and pedal control and the lowered seat position also makes transfers much easier.

Marlena is now all ready to cruise the coast.

CUSTOM SOLUTIONS for seniors

As the need for assistive technology to support people to stay in their homes increases, unfortunately the range of items available does not. We all have a different set of abilities, goals and interests. Many aides prescribed either do not fit or do not work properly and often sit in the spare room untouched, or people adapt their ways to fit the equipment. Our role is to ensure the equipment works for you to get the absolute best outcome.

MICHAEL'S STORY

Michael came to us with a challenge that was significantly affecting his lifestyle. Michael had cerebral ischemia (a stroke) which resulted in limited movement in his left arm. He was using a walking stick to aid his mobility around the home and while out and about.

The challenge with using a walking stick was it was causing instability and a fear of falling, which often meant Michael would stay home.

What he desperately wanted was the ability to move around independently with ease and safety having the option to rest when he is fatigued. Michael had tried commercially available walkers but he was unable to safely hold and steer the walker using only his right arm. There were no

other options for Michael.

Luckily, Michael found TADQ and we were trialling a new one-handed walker system that had been developed by our sister organisation TADACT. In collaboration with our team in Brisbane a volunteer set to work to make one for Michael. The day we delivered it to Michael, he was able to walk out into the garden and sit and listen to the birds, something he had been greatly missing.

A commercially available walker was adapted with a bar running between the existing handles that could be swung out of the way when Michael needs to rest. The cross bar was fitted with a simple locking mechanism and brake which could be easily used with one hand. Perfect!

FREEDOM WHEELS

Freedom Wheels is an exciting program that offers a personalised, custom-built bike. Each bike is tailored to the child's height and weight, as well as physical, sensory and cognitive abilities. We can provide custom supports to help children with disabilities to gain confidence and feel the freedom of riding a bike.

MAX'S STORY

Max is a 4 year old boy with a love of adventure and one of the rarest conditions in the world, Congenital Myasthenic Syndrome which affects his balance and means his muscles fatigue very quickly, particularly in his legs.

Max finds it difficult to do many of the things other children take for granted, such as running, playing on the playground and riding a bike. Due to Max's condition, he would not have the strength in his legs to pedal a normal bike nor have the balance to sit correctly on the seat and keep his feet on the pedals and so inevitably this would be another play time activity he would have to sit out.

The family heard about the Freedom Wheels bikes through their therapist and wanted to see if this could give Max the opportunity they never


thought possible. During the assessment with Max we were all nervous to see how he would go riding his very first bike. Our nerves were soon turned to joy when Max took to it like a duck to water. The stabilisers offered him extra balance support and the foot cups help guide his feet, before we knew it we were all running to try and keep up.

A delivery by Santa's elf ensured Max woke up to a fantastic surprise on Christmas morning and now he can join in with his friends. Max absolutely loves to go really fast, but most importantly, he feels included and part of the family enjoying a day out. This is what Freedom Wheels is all about, finding a way for family and friends to all enjoy the fun of bike riding.

To see your child miss out on anything breaks your heart and there will always be challenges ahead for Max, but to be provided with equipment that can help him lead as normal life as possible is wonderful. ControlAble is a fantastic new program that offers the opportunities for people who are unable to navigate a standard controller, to have full control and be able to access and play video games. Using the latest technology and experienced staff, we are able to asses and custom-build a system that works for you. Whether that is adapting a standard controller for hand control or extracting buttons for use by other areas of the body such as chin, knees or toes. Each controller is designed to get your best gaming performance.

ETHAN'S STORY

Ethan Hasset lived in Mackay with family and enjoyed doing all the things many 19 year old do, going out with friends, having fun and playing his Xbox. When he not socialising, he worked with his dad at their local hospital doing maintenance jobs but only until his plumbing apprenticeship started.

One day, while out enjoying time with friends on his guad bike, Ethan lost control of the bike, crashing into a storm water drain. Ethan was taken to hospital where it was discovered he had suffered a C4 complete spinal cord injury.

The effect of this accident was life changing for Ethan and subsequently meant being transferred to the rehabilitation unit at the Princess Alexandra Hospital in Brisbane where he spent most of his time. To help eliminate some boredom, Ethan

wanted to start playing his Xbox again but found that due to the accident he found navigating the controller difficult and was often limited to games he could actually play. On seeing his frustration, the therapist at the hospital contacted us to see if we could help.

After looking at Ethan's abilities and working around what he can do, rather than what he can't. Our Electronics Engineer Dan was able to build and completely new controller with softer, easier to access buttons and sticks as well as relocating buttons to other areas of the controller. Now Ethan has full access to all the controls he needs and is super excited to play all the latest games that he never thought he would be able to play again.



TAD ASSIST MINOR HOME MODIFICATIONS
